St. Mary's Nursery and Primary School is proud of its child-centred educational provision.

Our school's distinctive Catholic ethos creates a happy, caring and stimulating environment in which all children can achieve their potential and experience success in their learning and development.

Catholic education is inclusive and our school welcomes children from all denominations and cultural backgrounds.

Starting Nursery School

By the time children start Nursery, they have already had a variety of experiences and have developed in a number of ways.

Language and Literacy


Religious Education

'Language and Literacy' is taught through the three main areas of talking and listening, reading and writing. Literacy is key to learning and so we focus on developing your child's ability to understand and use language appropriately. We strive to ensure that each pupil can express themselves creatively, communicate confidently and interact effectively with others.



Mathematics and Numeracy

In St. Mary's, mathematical ideas are developed by making use of practical materials and electronic resources and by exploring various mathematical processes. Stimulating activities are provided for your child in the areas of 'Number', 'Measures', 'Shape and Space' and 'Handling Data'. Our pupils also engage in a wide range of purposeful, problem-solving activities which involve them in different modes of mathematical learning, including playing, exploring and investigating, doing and observing, talking and listening, asking questions, reflecting, drafting, reading and recording.





The World Around Us

We believe that children are innately imaginative and creative and so these dispositions are valued and nurtured in St. Mary's by providing your child with exciting and relevant contexts for their learning.

Children learn about how things work and about

the characteristics of the natural world, through investigation and discovery. We provide pupils with opportunities to ask questions about themselves and the nature of the world around them.



The Arts

In St. Mary's, creativity is developed through every area of the curriculum and is closely linked with all aspects of learning. Art and Design, Drama and Music – known as 'The Arts' – provide many opportunities for developing this creativity. Pupils are encouraged to express their ideas and feelings in a variety of ways with the aim that their individuality, imagination and creativity develop during their years in primary school.

In particular, our school is known for its Choir, often with up to one hundred children from Years 4-7 singing together.

Physical Education

Through Physical Education, specific attention is given to the physical development, health and well-being of your child. In St. Mary's, pupils experience a sense of fun, enjoyment and achievement through a variety of progressively challenging activities in P.E. Pupils are encouraged to participate in many individual and team sports including Dance, Gymnastics, Athletics, Games and Swimming.

Our school has recently been awarded '5 Star GAA' status.





Personal Development & Mutual Understanding

Through our outstanding level of pastoral care and through a variety of learning experiences, pupils are encouraged to develop their self-confidence and self-esteem, to think about moral values and to develop their personal and interpersonal skills. 'Personal Development and Mutual Understanding', as a distinct Area of Learning, focuses on encouraging your child to become personally, emotionally and socially effective, to lead healthy, safe and fulfilled lives and to become confident, independent and responsible citizens.

Religious Education



We aim to develop the distinctive Catholic ethos of our school, to enrich the spiritual and moral development of your child and to foster links with the Parish of Cappagh. We assist parents in

preparing children for the Sacraments of Penance, Eucharist and Confirmation, recognising that parents are key educators of their children – particularly in the areas of faith and religion. We endeavour to develop each child's sense of confidence in his/her own identity and an understanding and respect for traditions other than his/her own. We welcome children from a variety of denominations and cultural backgrounds.

Assessing Your Child's Progress

Assessment is an integral part of the learning process. As parents, you will be kept fully informed of your child's progress.

The school monitors your child's progress carefully through a range of assessment techniques and strategies. You will have the opportunity to meet with the Class Teacher during Term I and will receive a written Annual Report on your child's progress in:

- •Areas of Learning;
- •Cross-Curricular Skills; and
- •Thinking Skills and Personal Capabilities.

For children with special needs, a comprehensive programme of class-based teacher support and/or input from external agencies/professionals is available.

SCHOOL HOURS AND COLLECTION ARRANGEMENTS

Lessons begins at 9.00am sharp but pupils may enter school from 8.50am in the morning. Parents are asked to make necessary childcare arrangements as supervision is not in place before this time. Nursery hours are 9.00am-12.00pm. For Year I & Year 2, school finishes at 2.00pm. For other Year Groups, pupils finish at 3.00pm.

Prompt collection of pupils at 2.00pm and 3.00pm is very much appreciated as this allows staff to continue with planned school development work or meetings promptly.

AFTER SCHOOL CLUBS until 4.00pm

An After School Programme operates in St. Mary's from 2.00–4.00pm each day. Hourly activities are priced at £3.75 with a broad range available throughout the year, including a wide variety of sports. We offer a wide variety of Arts and Crafts, Gaelic, Netball, Soccer, Gymnastics, Choir, Lego, Board Games, ICT,



Early Years Play, Golf and Play Clubs. The programme is advertised termly with prices and registration details. This 'wraparound' provision has been a very popular, affordable service for our families.

Are you making an application to our Nursery Unit for September 2025?

Potential applicants should be aware that our Nursery has been recommended to be part of the Pre-School Standardisation Programme from September 2025. This means that, subject to Ministerial approval, our Nursery's pre-school provision will change from part-time to full-time for September 2025.

CHILD PROTECTION and SAFEGUARDING

Mrs McAuley (Principal) is the Designated Teacher for Child Protection. She is supported by Mrs M. Kelly (Deputy Designated Teacher for Child Protection) and Mrs L. Quinn (Deputy Designated Teacher for Child Protection).

BREAKFAST, BREAKTIME CLUBS and SCHOOL MEALS

School Canteen staff provide a range of nutritious snacks for pupils who wish to purchase breakfast from 8.30am* in the school's Breakfast Club. Fruit juice, hot drinks, cereal, toast, pancakes, scones etc. are available at a subsidised cost and can be purchased daily. **Please note: School remains closed to other pupils before this time.*

The School also promotes a 'healthy break'. Pupils may bring in healthy snacks** or avail of the school's Breaktime Club, run by School Meals staff. Prices for various items, such as fresh fruit or fruit juice, are communicated to parents at the start of each school year and updated when needed. ***Please support the school's Health Promotion policy by avoiding sending in crisps, biscuits, sweets or other sugary snacks or drinks. Additionally, a number of pupils have a nut allergy and so parents should ensure that all food sent to school is <u>nut free</u>. The school cannot accept birthday cake or birthday treats to be given out in school either, for this reason.*

A varied and nutritional menu is available in St. Mary's School Canteen. Prices and the Menu are shared at the start of the year. Alternatively, pupils may bring a <u>healthy</u> packed lunch. All lunchboxes and drinks bottles should be clearly labelled with the child's name and class.

ATTENDANCE

Rates of attendance at St. Mary's PS are high and are felt to contribute greatly to pupils' academic performance. Where pupils are absent from school one day or more, parents are asked to telephone the School Secretary school or send a short note to the Class Teacher to explain the absence. Assistance in this matter is appreciated as attendance is closely monitored by school and EA Education Welfare.

WHEN A CHILD FEELS UNWELL IN SCHOOL

Should your child feel or present as unwell in school, the school will contact you to let you know and, if necessary, request collection. It is therefore vitally important that the school has up-to-date contact details for all parents, as well as a contact number in case of Emergency. It is the policy of our school to make contact with parents should your child receive a bump to the head. It is then left to parents' discretion whether the child stays in school or is taken home.

VISITORS TO THE SCHOOL

All visitors to the school – including parents, childminders, guardians – are required to report to the Main Office via the Intercom in the front porch if needing to pass on a message or to see or collect a child during the school day. This monitoring helps the school maintain Child Protection requirements by enabling us to know who is on the premises at any given time. All who work in school appreciate your co-operation with this important matter.

SPECIALIST MUSIC TUITION and CHOIR

The school provides a range of music development opportunities to its pupils. Beyond the delivery of the 'Music' aspect of 'The Arts' curriculum, pupils in P4-P7 also receive Tin Whistle Tuition, at a small charge. Pupils may avail of specialist tuition provided by the Western Region Music Service to learn a range of brass and string instruments. The school also boasts a talented School Choir which competes in a range of competitions and performs regularly at community events.

SCHOOL TRIPS

Pupils have the opportunity to participate in events outside of school. For any external trip, the school will seek written consent from parents. Prompt replies are always appreciated. Parents are often required to contribute towards the cost of school trips.

STAYING INFORMED

Communication between school and home is electronically via our school app, 'SchoolsNI', which parents are required to download as all messages are issued through this app. School also keeps parents up-to-date with all that is happening and celebrates achievements via the school website www.etmaryakilyclogher.co.uk. The dates of school terms and holidays are published on the school website at the start of each academic year. Our Parent Support Group also maintains a Facebook page St. Mary's PS Kilyclogher Parent Support Group.

CONCERNS AND COMPLAINTS

The school prides itself on close partnership working with parents. Should any concern or query arise, parents are encouraged to contact the Class Teacher <u>at the earliest opportunity</u> so that matters can be discussed, resolved or dealt with. Parents may also contact Mr McKenna the Vice Principal or Mrs McAuley (Principal). School Staff and the Board of Governors seek to maintain positive relationships at all times, in the best interests of each pupil.

FIRST AID

Members of teaching staff are trained as designated First Aiders in the event of an accident or emergency. All Classroom Assistants and Supervisors are also training in basic First Aid.

PASTORAL CARE

In St. Mary's, our strong pastoral care permeates all aspects of school life and is based upon the strong Catholic ethos which prevails. Pastoral care was found to be outstanding in the school's most recent Inspection. Class teachers promote pupils' self-esteem through praise and rewards. Each month, selected pupils from each classroom are awarded a certificate for an aspect of school life, e.g. good work, positive behaviour, teamwork, most improved, co-operation, effort in class, achievement in learning etc. We also have 'Pupil of the Week' and 'Table of the Week', amongst many other award opportunities.

St. Mary's provides a warm and caring environment where each child is made feel safe, secure and valued. Our atmosphere is one that encourages ALL children to do their best in all aspects of school life. We strive to ensure that each individual achieves his/her potential academically, socially, physically, emotionally and spiritually. Our pastoral policies include, for example, 'Pastoral Care', 'Anti-Bullying', 'Positive Behaviour', 'Child Protection', 'E-Safety' and 'Administration of Medication'. These are made available to parents at the start of each school year and on request.

Parental and Community Involvement

Our school encourages a positive partnership approach between home, school and parish for the benefit of our pupils. St. Mary's benefits from a pro-active Board of Governors and an enthusiastic, supportive Parent Support Group which organises fundraising events during each school year and supports the school in practical ways when requested. The school is an integral part of the community and the Cappagh Parish.

Respective Functions of the Board of Governors in relation to Admissions.

The Admissions Criteria will be applied by the Board of Governors. When considering which children should be selected for admission, the Board of Governors will only take into account information which is detailed on or attached to the application form. Parents/guardians should therefore ensure that all information pertaining to their child and relevant to the school's admissions criteria is stated on the application form or attached to it. Examples of such information include whether the child/children have brothers or sisters attending.

Children who are not normally resident in Northern Ireland will not be considered for places, until all children who live in Northern Ireland have been considered. The Board of Governors has determined that, in the event of there being more applicants than places available, the following criteria will be applied, in the order set down, to select children for the available places. Preference will be given to those applications that place St Mary's Primary School Nursery Unit as their 1st choice of pre-school provision.

Admissions Criteria

A timetable of pre-school admissions procedures setting out the dates by which an application is to be submitted is available at <u>www.eani.org.uk/admissions</u> under 'Pre-School Admissions'. During the admissions procedure when applying the criteria <u>punctual applications</u> will be considered before <u>late applications</u> are considered.

The application procedure opens on 10 January 2025 at 12noon (GMT) and an application submitted by the closing date of 24 January 2025 at 12noon (GMT) will be treated as a <u>punctual application</u>. An application received after 12noon (GMT) on 24 January 2025 will be treated as a <u>late application</u>.

As the <u>pre-school admissions procedure is in two stages</u> the timetable also specifies the relevant dates at Stage 2 which will determine if an application is to be considered as <u>punctual</u> or <u>late</u>.

Statutory Criteria

1. Children from socially disadvantaged circumstances in their final pre-school year who were born:

- on or between 2 July 2021 and 1 July 2022 (inclusive) and whose parents have not exercised their right to defer their child's entry to primary school; or,
- on or between 1 April 2021 and 1 July 2021 (inclusive) or were due to be born on or between those dates but were born earlier; and, have not attended or are not currently attending a funded pre-school setting under the Pre-School Education Programme as a target aged child; and, that child's parent has completed a request to defer their child starting P1 until September 2026.

Note: Children from 'socially disadvantaged circumstances' means a child whose parent has an entitlement to (i) Income Support, or (ii) Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance, or (iii) Income related Employment and Support Allowance, or (iv) Universal Credit. When parents apply for places for their child on this basis they must provide Benefit Verification to confirm that they have an entitlement. The application procedure for Pre-School will outline how Benefit Verification can be submitted.

2. Children not from socially disadvantaged circumstances (as defined above) who are in their final pre-school year (as defined by criterion 1).

Sub-Criteria

If there are more children satisfying the last criterion above which can be applied, then selection for the remaining places will be on the application of the following sub-criteria in the order set down below:

- 1. Children whose parent(s)/guardian(s) reside in the Parish of Cappagh.
- 2. Children with a brother(s)/sister(s)/half-brother(s)/half-sister(s) presently or previously enrolled in St Mary's Primary School or St Mary's Nursery Unit, Killyclogher.
- 3. Children who, in the opinion of the Board of Governors, have special home circumstances, considered in the following order.
 - (a) A child who has one or both parents deceased.
 - (b) A child whose parent(s)/guardian(s) has/have a long-term illness medical evidence required.
 - (c) A child from a family of three or more pre-school children evidence required.
 - (d) Children who are twins (or other multiple births).
 - (e) A child who is a Child Looked After, defined by the Children (NI) Order 1995 as children 'who are in the care of a Trust or who are provided with accommodation by the Trust'
- 4. Other children.

In the event of oversubscription in the last criterion which can be applied, then selection for all places remaining in this category will be on the basis of the initial letter of the surname as stated on the birth certificate, in the order set out below:

M Q P G D U J E O X B S F Mac L T I Z V Mc H A N R W K C Y The order was determined by a randomised selection of letters carried out by governors of the school at a meeting on 5th November 2024.

In the event of surnames beginning with the same letter, the subsequent letters of the surnames will be used in alphabetical order. In the event of two identical surnames the alphabetical order of the initial of the forenames as stated on the birth certificate will be used. It is important that parent(s)/guardian(s), when submitting the application form, give all the relevant supporting information and written evidence that may be needed as per the published admissions criteria including the child's birth certificate. In particular, please include the full names of presently or previously enrolled siblings in St Mary's Primary School, Killyclogher, or St Mary's Nursery Unit, Killyclogher, within your application.

Non-Statutory Criteria

3. Children who were born:

- on or between 1 April 2021 1 July 2021 (inclusive), or were due to be born on or between those dates but were born earlier; and
 - have attended or are currently attending a funded pre-school setting under the Pre-School Education Programme as a target aged (not penultimate aged) child; and,
 - that child's parent has completed a request to defer their child starting P1: or,
- on or between 2 July 2022 and 1 July 2023 (inclusive); or,
- on or between 1 April 2022 and 1 July 2022 (inclusive) or were due to be born on or between those dates but were born earlier; and that child's parent has completed a request to defer their child starting P1 until September 2027.

Tie Breaker – Non-Statutory Criterion 3

Children within Criterion 3 will be selected in Chronological Order of Age – eldest child first. In the event of two or more children having the same date of birth, the above randomised selection of letters will be used.

Duty to Verify

The Board of Governors reserves the right to require such supplementary evidence as it may determine to support or verify information on any applicant's application form. If the requested evidence is not provided to the Board of Governors by the deadline given, this will result in the withdrawal of an offer of a place. Similarly, if information is supplied which appears to be false or misleading in any material way, the offer of a place will be withdrawn.

Waiting List Policy

Should a vacancy arise after 10 June 2025, the above criteria will be applied to select pupils from our Waiting List. The school will contact you in writing if your child gains a place in the school by this method. Your child's name will be automatically added to the Waiting List. Please contact the school if you wish for your child's name to be removed from the list.

The Board of Governors of St Mary's Primary School has determined that the following criteria shall be applied, in the event of the number of pupils applying for places in Year 1 in September, being greater than the admissions number, in the order set down below. Within each criterion priority will be given to those pupils regarded by the Board of Governors, on the basis of supporting written evidence by parent/guardians and/or statutory agencies, as having special circumstances, medical, social or security factors.

ADMISSIONS CRITERIA – YEAR 1

_During the admissions procedure when applying the criteria <u>punctual applications</u> will be considered before <u>late applications</u> are considered. The application procedure opens on 10 January 2025 at 12noon (GMT) and an application submitted by the closing date of 24 January 2025 at 12noon (GMT) will be treated as a <u>punctual application</u>. An application received after 12noon (GMT) on 24 January 2025 and up to 4 pm on 29 January 2025 will be treated as a <u>late application</u>, this is also the last date and time for processing a change of preference in <u>exceptional circumstances</u>. After 4 pm on 29 January 2025 no applications will be processed until after the close of procedure on 9 April 2025.

COMPULSORY SCHOOL AGE

Any child who reaches their 4th Birthday on or before 1st July 2025 is of Compulsory School Age. Under the School Age (NI) Act which became law in Northern Ireland in April 2022, 'compulsory school age' also includes those children who deferred commencing Primary 1 in September 2024 as defined by the new School Age (NI) Act (both groups to be treated equally).

Priority will be given to children resident in Northern Ireland at the time of their proposed admission to the school before those who are not so resident.

Where the school is oversubscribed, the order of priority in which pupils shall be admitted to the school is:

- 1. A child who has a brother(s), a sister(s), a half-brother(s), a half-sister(s) or foster brother/ foster sister, presently or previously enrolled in St. Mary's Primary School, Killyclogher, or St. Mary's Nursery Unit, Killyclogher.
- 2. A child who resides in the Parish of Cappagh.
- 3. Other children.

When all the above criteria have been applied, selection for all places remaining in this category will be on the basis of the initial letter of the surname as per the birth certificate, in the order set out below: -

S L Q E N G I K J Y V X F Mac Z M D R H P O Mc U W B A T C

The order was determined by a randomised selection of letters. In the event of surnames beginning with the same letter the subsequent letters of the surnames will be used in alphabetical order. In the event of two identical surnames the alphabetical order of the initials of the forenames as per the birth certificate will be used.

YEAR 1 ADMISSIONS - AFTER THE BEGINNING OF THE SCHOOL YEAR

Children who apply to enter the school during the academic year will be considered using the same criteria as for Year 1.

DUTY TO VERIFY

The Board of Governors reserves the right to require such supplementary evidence as it may determine to support or verify information on any application.

If the requested evidence is not provided to the Board of Governors by the deadline given, this will result in the withdrawal of an offer of a place. Similarly, if information is supplied which appears to be false or misleading in any material way, the offer of a place will be withdrawn.

WAITING LIST POLICY

Should a vacancy arise after placement letters have been issued, all applications for admission to Primary 1 that were initially refused, new applications, late applications and applications where new information has been provided will be treated equally and the published criteria applied. This Waiting List will be in place until the end of the academic year. The school will contact parents in writing if a child gains a place in the school by this method.

A child's name will be automatically added to the Waiting List. Parents should contact the school if they wish for their child to be removed from the list.

ADMISSIONS CRITERIA – YEARS 2-7

The Board of Governors of St Mary's Primary School has determined that the following criteria shall be applied in the order set down below to all pupils seeking admission to Years 2-7. A child will be considered for enrolment provided that the school will not exceed its enrolment number as determined by the Department of Education.

- 1) A child who has a brother(s), a sister(s), a half-brother(s), a half-sister(s), foster brother/sister presently or previously enrolled in the school or Nursery Unit.
- 2) A child who normally resides in the Parish of Cappagh.
- 3) A child will be considered for admission provided that, in the opinion of the Board of Governors, he/ she would not prejudice the efficient use of the school's resources.

In the event of over-subscription in the last criterion which can be applied then selection for all places remaining in this category will be on the basis of the initial letter of the surname as per the birth certificate, in the order set out below: -
